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BIG-SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES IN A SMALL-SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT

Fremont Christian School is a private, co-educational college-preparatory school established in 1968 as an educational outreach of Harbor Light Church. FCS strives to provide every child with a safe place to grow, learn, and explore their faith. Though we wholeheartedly encourage students to explore Christianity, students of all faiths are welcome in our community.

At FCS, we desire for every student to see themselves and everyone around them as the *imago Dei*: unique individuals made in the image of God, for a purpose. We value providing students with a wide variety of opportunities for growth through classroom experiences with dedicated teachers, participation in competitive sport teams, and access to an exceptional and robust visual and performing arts program. We believe that any amount of time your child spends with our school is a chance to learn and grow further into the person God has called them to be.

INSTRUCTIONAL PHILOSOPHY

FCS provides a growth-oriented, advanced college-preparatory curriculum that reflects a biblical worldview. [Guided Language Acquisition Design \(GLAD\)](#), a research-based model rich in advanced vocabulary, supports instruction across content areas, promotes metacognition, encourages gradual release of responsibility, and embodies 21st-century learning. The GLAD model emphasizes problem-solving, respecting others, and making wise decisions. Metacognitive learners are able to reflect on and analyze their own learning: *Does this make sense? How am I doing? What am I doing well? What can I do better?*

ACADEMIC & COLLEGE COUNSELING

College preparation is a focus at FCS. Formal college planning begins in Grade 8, with all students participating in the ACCR (Applied College and Career Readiness) elective. This class allows students to become familiar with college admission topics such as the importance of course selection, study skills, volunteerism, leadership, and rigorous achievement. All eighth-grade students meet individually with the college counselor to discuss how to best prepare for high school. They work with the counselor to create an individual, four-year, high school course plan. The counselor is always available to meet with students and parents throughout a student's high school career.

HONORS COURSES

Eligibility for a math course is based on both ability and performance. Highly qualified students may be offered a place in an advanced course. Any student who wishes to do work at an above-average level can earn honors credit by receiving a grade of A in regular coursework in addition to completing special assignments in English, social studies, science, or math. These assignments provide the opportunity to perform independent work and improve skills such as time management, while also providing an enriching challenge for the student.

MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS

Math competition opportunities include the International Math Competition (ACSI), Math Kangaroo, NLMC (Noetic Learning Math Contest), and the AMC-8 (American Mathematics Competition). [Learn More](#)

CENTER FOR TALENTED YOUTH

FCS participates in the [Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth \(CTY\)](#) for students in Grades 2 –8. CTY identifies advanced academic talent in young people and trains them to maintain high academic standards for themselves throughout their school years. Highly encouraged at FCS, participation in CTY can open new resources, including a peer network for academically minded young people worldwide.

VISUAL & PERFORMING ARTS

Visual and performing arts at the junior high level include handbells, choir, and band. Music and drama students collaborate to bring professional-level musicals and classic plays to our stage. Choral and instrumental groups perform and compete at a variety of venues. [Learn More](#)

Opportunities to participate in art contests and exhibitions include the Scholastic Art Awards, Science Without Borders Challenge, and the Alameda County Fair.

ATHLETICS

The Junior High Warriors compete in the West Division of the Bay Area Christian School Athletic League (BASCAL). Girls' and boys' teams include flag football, basketball, soccer, softball, and volleyball. FCS has an opportunity to compete for a league playoff championship after each eight-week season. CLUBS

Student clubs can facilitate leadership development and allow students to express a shared interest or passion. At FCS, students are encouraged to start and join clubs, which meet in their club advisor's room to serve, share, and learn from each other. Along with Student Council, this year students have organized clubs including art, badminton, Cards for Kids, Career Connect, Chinese culture, dance, environment, Girls Who Code, Math & Coding, Prayer Warriors, research exploration, and strings.

STUDENT LIFE

FCS values providing students with opportunities for leadership development, with one of the most prominent being participation in USSE (United Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Grade Council), comprised of three representatives per grade. Students run for office and are elected by their peers. The USSE works with the Student Activities Director to plan activities throughout the year for the junior high student body, including field games, Christmas activities, intramural sports tournaments, and other social events.

Because learning is not limited to the classroom, we at FCS provide numerous other opportunities to engage with our world and deepen knowledge. Throughout the school year, team-building activities — including a fall trip to Mt. Hermon — are utilized to help students learn to cooperate and work with others. Spring Spirit Week is one of the most memorable times of year. The year ends with the eighth-grade trip to Los Angeles' Museum of Tolerance and Disneyland/California Adventure.

THERAPEUTIC COUNSELING

In partnership with Christian Counseling Collective, FCS offers a limited series of therapy during the school day at parent request, subject to availability. These sessions are provided at no cost to students for managing stress, relationships, emotional and personal conflict, and more.

TECHNOLOGY INTEGRATION

We incorporate platforms and web applications to prepare students for life beyond FCS. Some of the platforms we integrate into our curriculum, including Canvas, Turnitin, and NoRedInk, are used at universities and workplaces across the nation.

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
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NATIONAL COMPARISON

The Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment is administered at the beginning of each academic year to determine what each student is ready to learn. The MAP assessments in reading, language, and mathematics provide teachers valuable data used to differentiate and meet the needs of all learners. The RIT score, a nationally normed data point, is compared to the grade-level mean (average) using data from millions of students. The results on the following graph show the percentage of students who scored above the 2020 normative data during our testing session in spring 2025. Students will be tested again in the winter and spring to track their personal academic growth this year.
